FROM THE PRESIDENT

By the time you read this an era of theatre organ playing will have drawn to a close. The concert on Sunday 29th September by our Patron Mr Ian Davies was his final full concert. He was advised by his doctor to ease up as he is not getting any younger.

lan is the last of a long line of theatre organists who entertained on the 'King of Instruments' during the Golden era of movie going. Those glorious days when a night at the movies was an event — live bands on stage — show girls — news reels — shorts — sing-a-long slides and the organ playing you in and out of the theatre, with a recital at interval. Not like todays efforts from the cinema owners — sit in a concrete box with no stage, sometimes not even curtains to cover the screen, you see some ads., then one movie and leave!

lan has been our patron since Reginald Dixon wrote and indicated he wished to opt out as patron because of the distance and his age, he could do nothing for us.

For eighteen years lan was the resident organist at the Melbourne Capitol — Regent and Plaza theatres, interrupted by the war, when he served in the Navy. He did have an opportunity to play some other organs while on active service.

Since 1963, Ian has performed at least fifty times for T.O.S.A. (N.S.W.) at the State and Capitol theatres also Marrickville Town Hall and the Orion Centre. He was the final organist of a multi-artist final concert at the Capitol prior to T.O.S.A. purchasing and removing the organ from the theatre in 1972. Then in October 1988, he was the first organist to play part of the opening concert at the Orion on the prebuilt organ.

The good news is that even though lan will not be doing any more full concerts, he advised me that next year, when his commitments to the R.S.L. Club finish, he will be able to come to more of our functions. He will on occasions, be able to play a couple of numbers on club nights, as this does not require the preparation that is needed for a full two hour concert, less stress and tension required.

Thanks lan for all you have done for N.S.W. T.O.S.A.

Once again membership time has come and gone but unfortunately not all of our members have renewed. If you know a member who did not renew, would you please ask them to contact me. I would like to know why they did not renew, if it was something that I or any other member of the committee may have done, we would like to know, as we are here to try and please the members. Walt Strony, passing through Sydney en-route to Adelaide, gave a very interesting and entertaining concert, at the home of John and Sue Atkinson at Hurstville, Saturday 21st September.

This multi-talented performer is certainly a Master of Registrations & Key Changes. At the end of the concert, John made the comment that he was amazed at the marvellous effects coming from the reconditioned Regent Theatre WurliTzer — sounds until then, unheard by him.

John has promised to provide me with interesting information concerning his unique and wonderous music room and the enormous and beautiful organ now gracing this specially designed room.

During supper-time in the garden, standing under the trees filtering coloured lights, Walt mentioned that he is going to the Capri Theatre, Adelaide, accompanied by Ed Zollman, owner of COLORADO PIPE ORGAN SERVICE, U.S.A. and his wife Patti Simon-Zollman, an accomplished organist. They will be providing direction in achieving the final tonal quality of the Capri organ.

Walt has produced a book "The Secrets of Theatre Organ Registration" originally only available direct from the U.S.A. - now an Australian publication may be purchased from the Capri Theatre, P O Box 307, Goodwood, S.A. 5034 for \$AUS36.00 - a book for organists, organ builders and all enthusiasts of the organ.



DAVID PARSONS O A M.

David Parsons began piano lessons at the age of eight and started pipe organ tuition when he was twelve years old from his father who has a Licentiate Degree from the London College of Music. With his father also a minister of the Church of England, David had virtually unlimited access to a large pipe organ where he became Church Organist at the age of fourteen. He was Chapel Organist at Callan Park Psychiatric Hospital for seventeen years, organist and choirmaster at St.Phillip's Church, Eastwood from 1965 to 1977 and is now organist and choirmaster at St.Matthew's Church, West Pennant Hills.

As a member of the Theatre Organ Society since 1967, David has given many concerts on the few remaining famous theatre organs. He played the Capitol Theatre 3/15 WurliTzer for the 1967 Convention and part of the final concert before it was removed from the theatre; the State Theatre 4/21 WurliTzer for two society including the National Convention in 1977; The Lyceum Theatre Christie for many Pleasant Sunday Afternoon Services; and of course the Prince Edward Theatre 2/10 WurliTzer now installed in Marrickville Town Hall, where some four public concerts, including the Fifth Birthday Concert in its new home were played by him. His first recording called "Long Live the WurliTzer" was made on this magnificent and historic 2/10 instrument in 1974. (A new Post Horn rank makes it now a 2/11 WurliTzer). He has also recorded the organ in the Great Hall of Newcastle University which has a very large Conn 3 manual custom built electronic pipe organ.

Undoubtedly a highlight of his musical career was the year 1969 when he became the Australian Champion Yamaha Organist and represented Australia in the world finals in Tokyo, Japan, which included a two weeks tour of the country as guest of Yamaha.

He was placed seventh in a field of nineteen world finalists, from a total of over three thousand contestants.

At two separate All-Gershwin concerts at the Conservatorium of Music, David was invited to play organ for the Concerto in F for two pianos and organ, as well as two solo organ spots during the performances.

A more recent highlight in his career was the invitation by the Sydney Opera House Trust to give an inaugural concert on the New Grand Organ on 28th June, 1979. So successful was this concert that the Sydney Morning Herald wrote on its front page the next morning, "An audience, claimed to be the largest ever for an Opera House concert assembled in the Concert Hall to hear the Grand Organ. Yesterday, 3000 people crammed into the hall which seats 2,700 to hear a concert by David Parsons, whilst another 1,000 watched it on video screens in the foyer."

As a direct result of this success, he was invited, by public demand, to give another on the 7th August as part of the inaugural series at which an estimated 2,000 people attended.

Finally, David holds regular organ concerts in his own home to raise funds for community and charitable organisations. He plays a large Conn 651 Theatre Organ with three sets of pipe speakers to an average of some seventy people each week and these nights are so popular that he is booked up approximately 15 months in advance.
