CLINTON WHITE

Commenced classical piano studies at the age of 8, continuing up to AMEB grade 7. He was successful in Eisteddfords in Wollongong & Goulburn and played in the Goulburn Eisteddford Championships at the age of 15.

Clinton first'discovered' theatre organ music in 1972 and was so enthralled by it, he joined the ACT chapterof TOSA. By 1974 he had the distinction of representing the Society as a cameo artist during the TOSA National Convention held in Adelaide playing the 2/12 WurliTzer owned by the S.A. Division of TOSA.

Clinton's first major concert appearance was in 1975 when he appeared with Ian McLean at the Albert Hall in Canberra. Since then he has made further appearances in Canberra, Goulburn, Yass, Cooma and Adelaide. Clinton has further gained experience from playing the WurliTzer theatre pipe organs at the Dendy Cinema, Marrickville Town Hall and the Blackett & Howden at Cinema North and the Christie at Kelvin Grove High School, Brisbane.

IAN MCLEAN

Ian's musical life began at the age of 9 in Perth when he began classical piano studies which he continued through until he passed with distinction AMEB grade 7 at the age of 15.

Ian's career started with playing for the Church, then wedding receptions and so on to a long succession of professional engagements as either pianist or organist. He was also seen as resident organist at the Oval and Blue rooms at the Queanbeyan Leagues Club during 1975-6.

Ian's first major concert was with Ray Clements at the fabulous Perth Concert Hall in 1973. He has sinced played two full scale concerts in Canberra, in 1974 with Clinton White and solo in 1976, to critical acclaim. His exciting style has also been heard as cameo artist, in 1975, on the 3/15 WurliTzer at the Dendy Cinema, Brighton, Victoria. Ian's greatest thrill was to play the State Theatre Sydney, even though quite a deal of the organ was not working.

NOTE: Clinton White and Ian McLean have both been working hard in Canberra towards the instalment of the ACT's COMPTON theatre pipe organ in the Albert Hall. Excitement there, is slowly starting to grow as this fine instrument is gradually approaching completion. The ACT Division has already indicated their desire to hold the National Convention in Canberra during 1982 and no doubt both Clinton and Ian will be included in the artist list.

A very successful evening was held by the Selwyn Theatre on behalf of the Society on the night of Saturday 18th October. The artist on this occasion was our very popular member Eric Smith who, in his own innimitabel style'captured' the full 'house' audience from the very start of the programme.

Eric put the Lawrence Welk organ through its paces with varied current and nostalgic pieces and the audience went home very satisfied indeed. The amount raised for TOSA was \$60 which was very gratifying, and proved once again the organisation and hard work effected by Ritchie Willis and Norm Read for the Society. Our sincere thanks go to Ritchie and Norm for their fine efforts and to Eric Smith for his generous donation to Society funds.

OUR WURLITZER TO BE OUT OF COMMISSION.

As you may recall, during December-January of 79/80 our organ was out of service to allow a major overhaul of the four rank chest in the Main chamber to take place. This year during the same period a similar project is planned for the large chest in the Solo chamber, and our WurliTzer will be out of commission from Monday 8th December 1980 to the end of January 1981.

ALL MEMBERS are invited to help in this project. It requires the removal of some 250 pipes which have to be CAREFULLY stored so that no damage occurs, the chest is then dismantled by removing at least 100 screws, and the parts are then transported to the home of our Secretary, Ernie Vale where work commences on the removal of the old leather from the 'air' motors and pallets. All small wooden parts are carefully cleaned and the air motors and pallets then re-faced with a special new leather, which is costly but long lasting. The air motors are then glued back in correct order and all parts are eventually taken back to Marrickville to be re-assembled.

The work involved is not greatly physical but it is time consuming, anyone who can give one night per week makes the job so much faster for all. Any member who can spare the time should partake in this project as it gives one greater understanding of the workings of the organ, and what goes on behind those shutters when a concert is being played.

BRITISH NEWS...from Ian Dalgliesh.

Despite the awe task of staging the Silver Anniversary ATOS Convention our local London and South of England Chapter arranged a superb concert at their favourite venue, the Gaumont-State, Kilburn, Northwest London on Sunday, August 3rd starring Australian Tony Fenelon.

Tony revolved and rose with the WurliTzer console at lp.m. playing 'Another Openin' Another Show' weaved together with 'Waltzing Matilda'..a bright start. He chose to get off the Howard seat and stand and announce each item. This made a pleasant change from the current craze of playing over-long medleys as many artists are doing over here these days. He then played several numbers including a very 'Wright-ish' smouldering version of 'Black Moonlight' which was superb.

I've often pondered over Fenelon's style. Here was an organist from 'Down Under', the convict colony, and his early records show that he seemed to play sometimes in a British style and other times in the post-war George Wright USA style. But his following tunes which were both classic and pop and march proved conclusively that he isn't one of your sleek copyists. He can tackle real music and register it well at that. My recommendation is--if you get a chance to book Fenelon, do so.

(review by Cliff Bingham)

Maybe this reviewer is just a little biased, when it comes to the music of Jonas, but this brilliant musician seems to get better and better, and this, his third Australian tour was no exception.

The first Marrickville concert however, caught Jonas a little unawares as the organ was not up to the usual high standard in the tuning department (brought about partly by a hot humid day). His programme however was an excellent one for followers of more modern music, featuring particularly music from some of the current "Space" movies. His encores consisted of a medley of requests called out from the audience and a courageous performance of the Widor Toccata; unfortunately the piece was a little beyond the organ by 5p.m.

The dusk recital at Sydney Town Hall brought forth sounds that this writer has not heard for many a long time. Apart from a major cipher during the Bach D Major, the organ responded magnificently to such items as Pomp and Circumstance No. 4, War March of the Priests, Toccata by Gigout and an outstanding arrangement of Star Wars.

The second Marrickville concert can be described in a word.. 'superb! The condition of the organ can also be described with the same word. Following a day of concerted tuning, regulating, balancing and finishing, the organ sounded like 25 ranks instead of 11, and behaved itself perfectly.

Jonas was obviously completely at ease with the instrument, its condition being due in no small measure to his advice and efforts. The programme content was again superb..something for everyone. Oldies, an Irving Berlin selection, current pops, You Cant Stop the Music, classics.. Mephisto Waltz and Sabre Dance to name just a few. The arrangements, registrations and general presentations were without peer, and one of our well known senior organists commenting that he had never heard such a range of tone colours from this organ before.

A fine performance to cap off a very successful tour.

After receiving the reports from the other TOSA Divisions, there is no doubt that the organ world definitely received an injection of exhuberance, as Jonas went from city to city, playing mostly on the local chapters' Theatre Pipe Organs, with one or two electronic presentation where pipes weren't available. Words cant express how much we have appreciated all the help and advice Jonas has given us in many ways, and how good it is to have such a great guy to get along with. I sincerely hope that it wont be too long before we can get him 'down' here again, and help to provide us with just a little more of his magic.
