



Also a bit of very bad luck was the total destruction of the bottom octave of 16 feet tubas in the recent fire at Noad & Sons factory. Don't know yet where a replacement set will come from.



HOLIDAY

While in Victoria your Editor went out to Brighton (twice) to see, hear and even play the Dendy Theatre Wurlitzer. This organ is superb. Unfortunately the day I went out there to spend a few 20 cents pieces in the meter, there was a nasty cypher which prevented me from "opening up", and the crescendo pedal was playing up. However the next night we went to the evening session and David Johnson very kindly played from 7 till 8 so we could get some stereo recording done. David concentrated on modern or hit-tune music, mainly to cater for the typical young Dendy Theatre audience, but it sure suited me for his technique was remarkable. We were very impressed with the delightful solo and piano effects he brought forth, not to mention the overpowering rich full organ tone. If you happen to be in Melbourne with a couple of hours to spare, a trip to the Dendy Theatre is a must. Also, coincidentally another must is the original home of the Dendy Wurlitzer, the Melbourne Capitol. The suspended concrete ceiling lit by thousands of hidden coloured lights surely must be one of Walter Burley Griffin's masterpieces. It has to be seen to be believed, and even then it's barely believable.

While in Tasmania I made recordings on seven organs, the most interesting being the two extremes, namely the single manual, no pedal organ of John Gray, 1823, at Rokeby, reputed to be the oldest organ in Australia, and the great Hill, Norman and Beard achievement of St. John's, Launceston; 3/61. Sydney organ builder Arthur Jones was responsible for the resoration and re-building of both of these instruments, and the results are two of the finest organs, in their respective categories, in the country. Another two musts for the travelling organ fan.

TOSA'S correspondent in Holland, GARY VANDERWERP writes:

"We wish all members of the organ society a very good and healthy 1971. Our Christmas was a traditional one with snow. In December we had the pleasure again to hear and see Reg Dixon at a concert in the AVRO Radio Studio, Holland, playing the 4-manual Compton during a broadcast. Harry Kompe, organist at the city theatre, Amsterdam, successor of Cor Steyn, is the originator of midnight organ concerts once a month, with a result that an organ federation is to be formed in Holland, similar to those in Australia and England. We have here on many occasions had the opportunity to hear Reg Dixon's successor, Ernest Broadbent over the B.B.C. playing the Blackpool Tower Ballroom organ. Yoop Walvis (see picture) is one of the few organists of the silent picture era still playing in Holland. Kind regards to my organ society friends."



"KINGS" THEATRE GORDON 2/8 CHRISTIE MAKES RARE (THEATRE ORGAN) APPEARANCE

The evening of Tuesday 30th March saw the Church of St. Columb, West rde absolutely jam-packed with people who had come to see and hear ALAN T. ANTER put the Christie through its paces. This organ, usually heard on Sundays playing hymns or Church voluntaries of various types was on this particular occasion, truly a theatre organ im all its original splendour, reminiscent of the days when Lance Wells, Idwal Jenkins, and lady organists Muriel Jeavons and Valda Kersey entertained the audiences of the Gordon Theatre from 1929 to the early fifties.

This is the only Christie in Australia re-installed in its original theatre organ condition, with beautifully voiced tibias, brilliant penetrating reeds, quiet contemplative strings, and all the banging tinkling and crashing of the toy counter. Not to mention the angelic Chrysaglott.

The faultless condition of this fine instrument is due in the main to its regular user and the evening's recitalist, ALAN TRANTER. Well over \$300 were raised for the fund of final restoration and re-installation in the proposed new church building. Such an effort is surely commendable; not only that, but in achieving this end, ALAN presented to us a most interesting programme, designed to show the great variety of moods the typical English Christie Theatre Organ could evoke.

Some of the more spectaculær items ALAN played were, a selection from Bizet's Carmen, von Suppe's Light Cavalry Overture, Ketelby's In a Persian Market, Bach's Toccata & Fugue in D Minor, Schubert's Serenade, Fibisch's Poem, Chaplin's Limelight, and a couple of brilliant pieces by Sidney Torch, "Shooting Stars" and "All strings and fancy free."

This concert, although not a TOSA function, was well attended by members, and was indeed most enjoyable, and I cannot help wondering if some of the other organs re-installed in similar situations in Sydney could sometimes make a rare appearance intheirtheatre capacity. Maybe one day.

Congratulations to ALAN TRANTER for bringing this interesting recital, so very capably and entertainingly played, to the people of Sydney.

A FRIEND PASSES

Members are indeed saddened by the passing of one John Castray, on 27th March. John Castray, one of our most respected members, was a fine musician, and music as well as "making music" was one of his great loves. ACROSS THE WAVES

AN exciting piece of news this week from the Denver Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. Remember our pars about the recording that member BILLY MALLE made in four channel (Quadrasonic) stereo sound? This was on the 4/26 Wurlitzer of Long Island University. Well it was only an experiment, but created such a sensation that now a disc and tapes will be released commer-

" In previews at the major High Fidelity shows and at the NARAS Convention recently it brought thunderous response and "stopped the show" at every exposure. It was the subject of two lead articles in AUDIO magazine for October and November, 1970. It will be given worldwide release in the most extensive distribution ever given any single theatre organ album to date. It will come in both two and four channel stereo editions on tape, disc and cassette, and be released by Enoch Light on the PROJECT 3 label. Enoch Light is one of the most famous and respected producers in the recording field, and noted for his distinguished instrumental releases in the popular music field. The album will carry three major firsts: It will be the first theatre organ album released on the Project | label; the first release on the Long Island University WurliTzer; and the first theatre organ album in the world to become available in four channel (AUADRASONIC) stereo sound."

AS you know, BILLY NALLE is a member of N.S.W. T.O.S.A. TOSA News congratulates Billy on this achievement and expresses with him the joy at his part in this venture, which is sure to be one of the milestones in the history of Recording Engineering development.
