REVIEW OF ROB RICHARDS' CONCERT – ORION CENTRE SUNDAY 25TH FEBRUARY 2018

And away we go again – a new year, a new President, and the first concert of an exciting 50th anniversary year for the Marrickville Town Hall /Prince Edward 2 manual 11 rank Wurlitzer 'gem'. However on this occasion, it was the Orion Centre's 3 manual 17 rank/Capitol Wurlitzer 'gem' that had an 'outing' in the hands of an old friend of TOSA(NSW) audience members, Rob Richards from the USA. Rob hails from Los Angeles where he is the house-organist at the 'El Capitan' Theatre in Hollywood, one of three of the original Grauman chain of theatres. Late in the 1980's, the Disney organisation purchased a controlling interest in a number of theatres in Hollywood, including the 'El Capitan' which became a flagship for Disney movie releases. The organ in the 'El Capitan' is the instrument which was originally installed in the San Francisco Fox Theatre in 1929 – a 4/37 'behemoth'.

Continuing the statistics, Rob reported that this visit to Australia was his 12th, the first being in 1983. On each previous occasion, he has performed on the Marrickville 2/11 organ, but this time, he was delighted to be able to perform on the Orion 3/17 organ. He noted particularly that this visit also coincided with the 30th anniversary of the installation of the Orion Wurlitzer. Further impressive statistics included that this year represents his 40th anniversary as a theatre organist, and it is coming up to his 20th anniversary with the Disney organisation in California.

Rob opened his concert with a full-bodied rendition of 'Hooray for Hollywood', the staple soundtrack element of any Academy Award ceremony. As an opener to the concert-proper, he chose to play a selection of ever-greens from 'Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs', from Walt Disney's 1937 first feature-length animated movie. The music was composed by Frank Churchill (and co-writers). Rob's selections included 'One Song', 'Heigh Ho', 'With a Smile and a Song', 'Whistle While You Work', 'Someday My Prince Will Come', 'The Dwarf's Yodel Song', 'I'm Wishing', and 'One Song' (a reprise for the finale). Not unexpectedly, this wouldn't have been the first time Rob had performed this selection, but it was performed with all the sensitivity and simplicity remembered of the marvellous early Disney creations.

The audience was left in no doubt from his opening bracket, that we were in for a most entertaining program from a very

experienced artist. The video coverage on the big screen clearly indicated Rob's ease of control over the many tone colours available to a performer from an instrument of the complexity of the Orion's 3/17 Wurlitzer. In so saying, congratulations must also go to the TOSA(NSW) crew members responsible for the maintenance and tuning of the instrument.

As if to emphasise the versatility of not only artist and instrument, Rob's next selection was a tribute to – as Rob described – "the late great George Wright", with the 1921 "jaunty response to poverty", 'Ain't we Got Fun' written by Richard A Whiting. Rob's recreation of the George Wright version (recalled from George's celebrated album 'George Wright Live – in Concert at the Rialto' in Pasadena California), was amazing, right down to the "have a banana" musical interjections.

Presumably as a sop to Rob's comfort- factor, he requested the audience's indulgence to allow him to take off his jacket, revealing an armless black T- shirt replete with Mickey Mouse sequins.

Rob commented that many people think he only plays music from Disney movies, but he explained that he regularly plays music from 'classic' movies. As an example, next on his play-list was the 'classic' 'As Time Goes By', associated with the 1942 Humphrey Bogart film 'Casablanca'. Rob's version provided the languorous nature of the original version performed by 'Sam' in the movie.



A break from the traditional came when Rob described his long-time interest in combining the music of the traditional theatre organ, with the possibilities introduced from electronic sources, and more recently, from the ever-growing applications of digital electronic technology. After some coaxing required by both the PA microphone and a little digital device of his own, he launched forth into the 'Theme from the Raiders of the Lost Ark' by John Williams with 'metranomic accuracy' and 'tympanic bravado'.

As a follow-up to this 'marriage' of computer with pipe organ, Rob chose to play a piece in honour of the person still living who has won the most Academy Awards – guess who? Not Walt Disney, who holds the record for having won the most Oscars, but the record for a recipient still living is the composer Alan Menken, with 7 Academy Awards. The piece Rob chose to play was from the 1992 Disney production of 'Aladdin', which was performed on the movie sound-track by Robin Williams, in the style of Cab Calloway, You ain't never had a 'Friend Like Me.' Now here was a piece that clearly had Rob right in his element. A jaunty, little piece enabling the 'bite-iest' ranks to speak out. Rob was clearly in his element in performing this 'cheeky' little piece.

It is interesting to note the growing emphasis placed on the use of digital electronic sources with theatre organs. This was the situation during the recent visit of Nathan Avakian, who drew heavily on digital electronic technology to supplement his more conventional performances.

At this point, may this ageing decrepit reviewer be permitted to make a, perhaps, politically incorrect comment about the 'marriage' of the pipe organ with computer devices. I think they don't necessarily make for a happy 'marriage'! Whereas it is always interesting to experiment and refine new processes, the attempts are not always pleasing. Modern electronic organs are meticulously designed to provide a pleasing balance for all the electronically-generated 'voices'. My argument regarding the attempted integration of pre-recorded backing tracks, is the inability of the performer to continuously vary tempii and balance between the respective sources, live and electronic. I maintain that Rob's performances utilising the little hand-held digital electronic device, was interesting, clever, but not necessarily satisfying to the ear (or maybe – my ear).

As the wrap-up item before interval, the audience was treated to 'A Trip to Outer Space' to, as Rob put it, "boldly go where no theatre organ audience has gone before" – not strictly correct but a good line! Beginning with the respective 'Themes from Star Treck', then with an 'injection' of the 'ET', theme, ending once again with the 'ubiquitous' theme from 'Star Treck'. It was during this spectacular performance that I realised that you can 'teach an old dog new tricks'. At this stage of my life I discovered that the Wurlitzer has a sustaining function. I became aware of this during the performance of the ET theme when I observed Rob's hands playing something different to the sustained chords established just before. The sustained chord continued until Rob's hand flew out to a button on the right-hand-side of the keyboard – and away went the sustained chord. How many others knew of this function? Come on, - be honest.



Refreshed following the interval break, what better introduction could there have been than the 'Theme from the Mickey Mouse Club', recalled from our early days of black and white TV, watching Jimmy, Annette, Cheryl, Tommy and Cubby (and the rest), introducing the Sunday night Walt Disney's Mickey Mouse Club. Rob mentioned having met up with a group of young people during the interval who called themselves "Aussie Disney Dorks". He undertook to include this meeting in his Facebook on his return to the USA.

Rob referred to his early mentoring by Lyn Larsen, and the fact that Lyn was 'instrumental' in Rob obtaining his first full-time job as an organist at a Pizza Parlour in South Dakota. He played an item which was a staple of Lyn Larsen - 'Broadway Rhythm' by Nacio Herb Brown. Rob chose to play his arrangement of Lyn Larsen's arrangement of 'Broadway Rhythm' complete with the introductory "Gotta Dance" attribute - from the1935 MGM movie 'Broadway Melody of 1936'.

Rob expressed his long-time affection for the music of Sigmund Romberg, no doubt related to his long-time friendship with the US theatre organist Ron Rhode. As a tribute to Romberg and Rhode, he chose to play 'Serenade' from the 'Student Prince' written in 1924, and Romberg's most successful operetta.

Next item on the agenda was 'Cheek to Cheek' from Irving Berlin's 1935 movie hit 'Top Hat' which featured Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers.

Returning to the Disney genre, Rob played a selection from 'Mary Poppins' which as he pointed out was derived from a book written by the Australian P.L. (Pamela) Travers, with the music by the brothers Richard and Robert Sherman. 'Feed the Birds', 'A Spoonful of Sugar', 'Chim Chim Cheree', 'Jolly Holiday', 'Lets' Go Fly a Kite', 'Supercalafragilisticexpialadoshis', and 'I Love to Laugh'.

President Craig Keller and his wife had requested Rob play (as Rob put it), his arrangement of the Boston Pop's arrangement, as recorded by Lyn Larsen, of '76 Trombones', (from The Music Man by Meredith Wilson, in 1957).

Rob related being at Los Angeles Airport awaiting his flight to New Zealand and Australia, and observing on a TV monitor, a news item regarding a light show on the face of the Empire State Building, celebrating the 30th anniversary of 'The Phantom of the Opera', and featuring the music from the show. He recalled having performed 25 years ago, a version of 'All I Ask of You' from 'Phantom of the Opera' as presented by Barbara Streisand. As a tribute to the Phantom's 30th anniversary and to Barbara Streisand, he provided a lovely restrained performance of 'All I Ask of You', - once more featuring the 'sustain' facility of the organ mentioned earlier. With only a short break, we were 'treated' to the computerised 'tom toms' again, to accompany the main theme of the 'Phantom of the Opera' – a far cry from the restraint of 'All I ask of You'. To conclude the piece we had an ever-so-brief appearance of the opening bars of J.S. Bach's Toccata and Fugue in

D Minor BWV 565.

The next piece of music was dedicated to the 'Aussie Disney Dorks' in the audience, and in particular to audience member, Caliope. Rob chose to play, as he put it, "the biggest hit song Disney has ever had" – the item – from the movie 'Frozen', 'Let it Go' (musical accompaniment supplemented from the digital devices). I must say that this pronouncement amazed me, I wouldn't have thought this piece would have even come close to most of the Disney favourites over the years. Well there it is – 'Let it Go' from 'Frozen'! It left me cold. By the way, this item was also accompanied by the side-man computerised 'tom toms'.

In closing Rob referred to a 'compliment' he received after one of his concerts when the audience member commented that it was a shame he had only one leg. The impression was gained when it was observed that it was only the left leg that was visible. Rob quickly clarified the situation that the right leg is usually involved in handling the 'expression' pedals and infrequently in operating the bass pedals.

As a finale to the concert-proper, Rob chose to perform the 'Hallelujah Chorus' from; 'The Messiah' by George Frederick Handel, complete with a synthetic symphony orchestra, courtesy of the computerised 'side-man'. He received enthusiastic applause for the performance which 'forced' him to return for an encore including, understandably, a couple of Disney favourites - 'Little Wooden Man', and 'When you Wish Upon a Star', but he also included 'Waltzing Matilda', (full bourdons), and 'I Still Call Australia Home', ending with the theme of his program for the day, 'Hooray for Hollywood'.

It was a delight to have Rob Richards return for the 12th time to Australia. He is definitely a very experienced and talented theatre organist. He relates well to an audience, but rather disappointingly, I suspect the audience roll-up fell short of the TOSA(NSW) Committee's hopes, and indeed must have been of some concern to the Society's very welcome guest artist.
