

NEWCASTLE COMES TO MARRICKVILLE

Newcastle did indeed come to Marrickville on Sunday 17th September on the occasion of our final FREE Sunday afternoon concert for this year. To be precise, a busload of over 50 plus several cars delivered the faithful followers to Marrickville to attend an "All Newcastle" concert in which organist, guest artist and compere were all Novacastrians. There were also a number of folk from the Gosford area, where our artist is quite widely known. The guest compere was A.B.C. Radio personality Geoff Moore, who quickly had the show off to a good start as he introduced organist David Pitts to the console. David presented an exceptionally varied programme which ranged through pops, popular, standards, music from recent films, theme music and a couple of religious items, one of which was the Lords Prayer.

The exceptionally hot, dry winds of the previous few days did unfortunately cause a few malfunctions to occur in the organ but David, realising that what can't be cured must be endured, carried on regardless, and it is to his credit that he remained unperturbed whenever a cypher did occur. Keith Shakespeare was the guest artist and he revealed a nice piano-styling in his interpretation of Norman Long's monologue "Thirty Tha's and Quid". Later, he took his place at the console, after confiding to his audience that he hadn't played a Wurlitzer for 27 years. David Pitts returned to the console to complete the concert in true theatre organ styling. He was recalled for an encore despite the fact that we were running later than usual. It was indeed Newcastle's day and as one member of the audience said to me - "those three Newcastle boys made a good trio". And so say all of us. The Society thanks them all for a most entertaining afternoon.

CONVENTION 73

Arrangements continue to progress very satisfactorily for the 1973 Easter Convention. All locations except one have been finalised and this one will shortly be confirmed. Artists have been selected and negotiations are now proceeding. It is hoped to be able to give further details shortly. IAN CAMERON'S RECORD EVENING

Although attended by only a handful of people the 78 RPM Record Evening presented by Ian Cameron was very much enjoyed by those who went along.

A wide range of recordings was heard and covered many Australian and Overseas organists.

Many of the discs have been obtained from the libraries of Broadcasting stations all over Australia and it was commented that many of these were of surprising standard although they cannot be expected to be of the same quality as modern microgrove recordings.

It was clear that Ian Cameron had put a lot of time and work into the preparation of the presentation and his selections from his collection of some 500 records gave examples of almost every aspect of Theatre Organ presentations in the hey-day of Theatre and Organ popularity.

The opportunity was afforded to hear rare recordings of the voices of Sydney Torch and Sandy McPherson.

The President expressed appreciation on behalf of those present to Ian Cameron and to the Ladies Committee who served a very welcome cup of tea and biscuits.

Ian has offered to have a small party at his home at some future date where the real enthusiasts can hear more of his collector's pieces.
